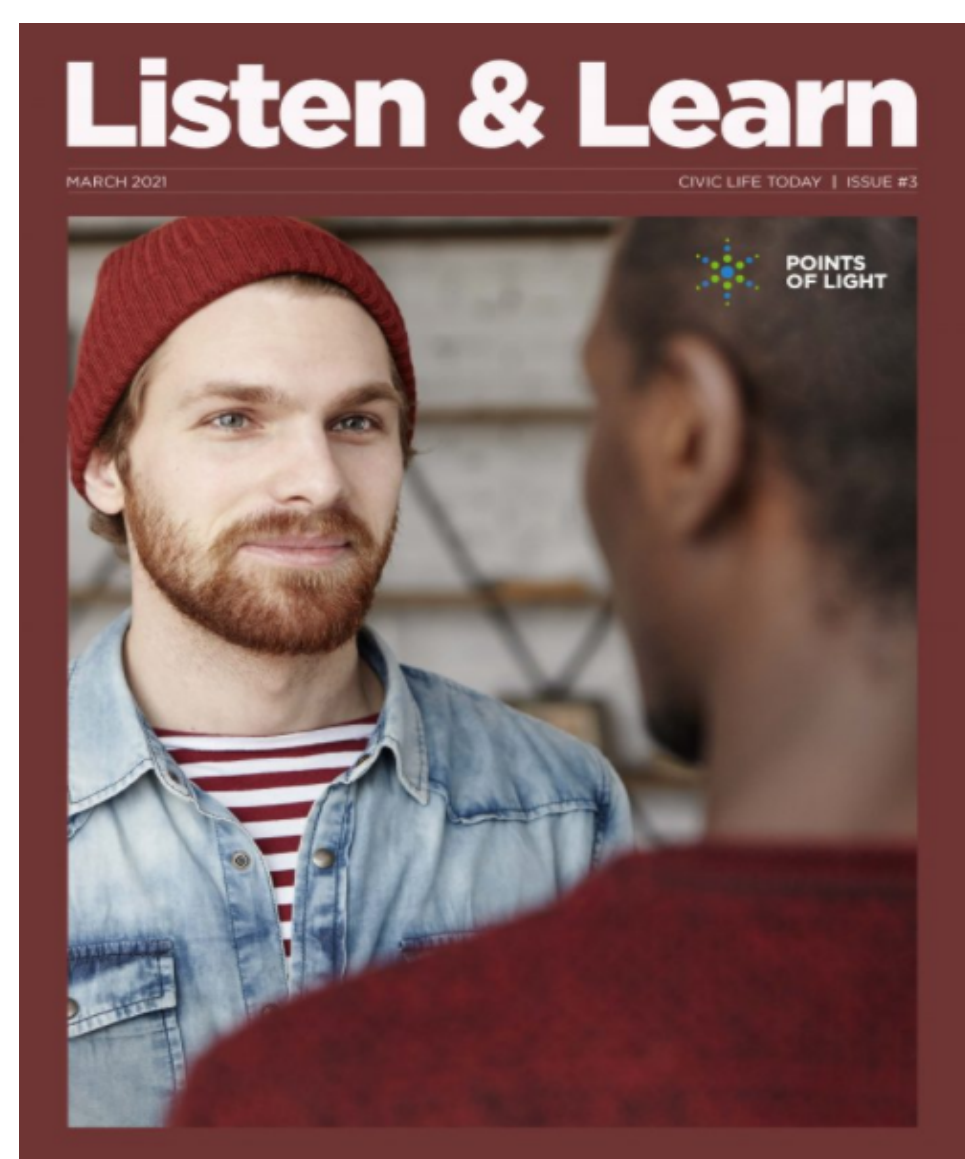


Civic Circle Discussion Series: *Listen & Learn*

If you feel yourself getting defensive because someone else expressed that they are feeling uncomfortable, focus on their emotion, not your defensiveness, to figure out the solution.



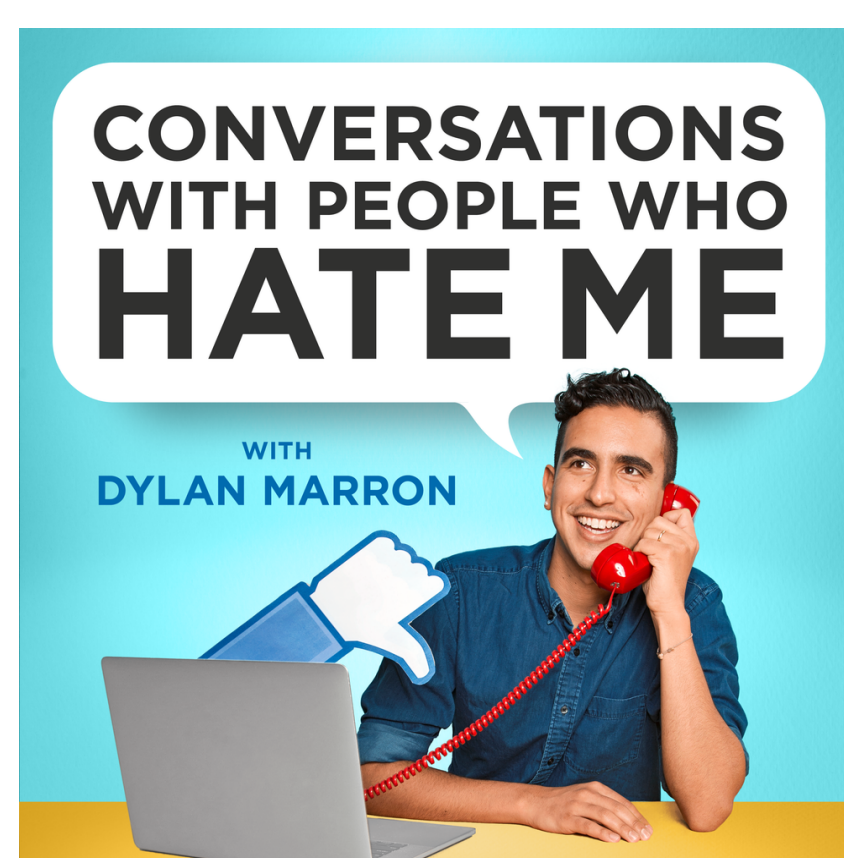
Remember, when discussing certain subjects, there's not always going to be a 'winner'.

Sometimes the value is in the discussion itself, rather than any results that may come from it.

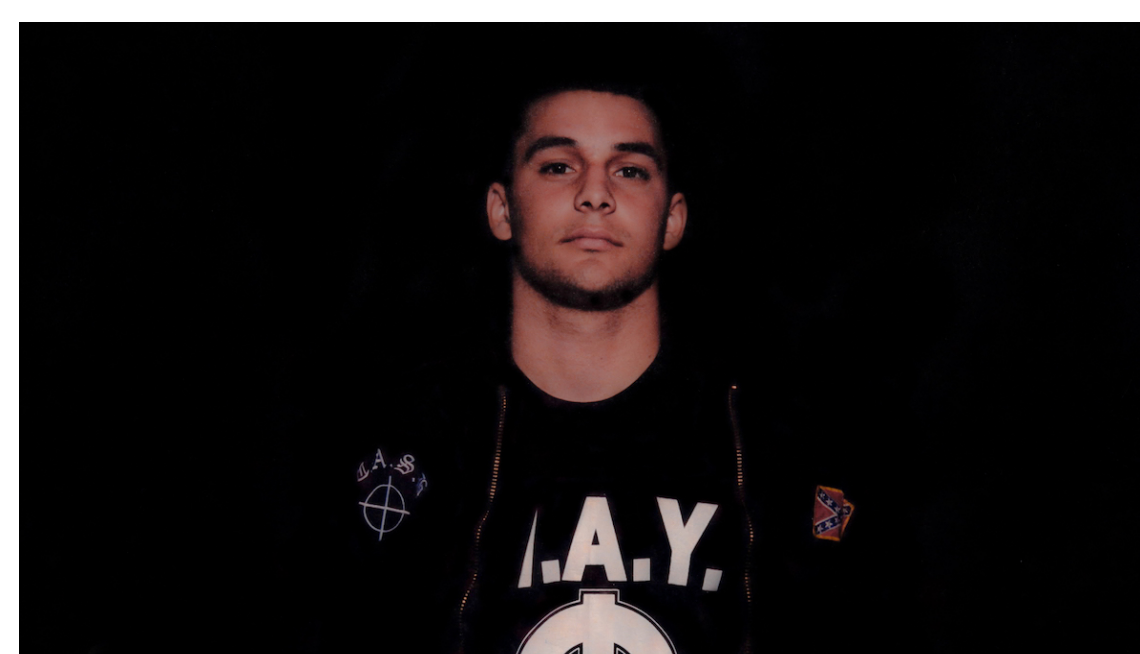


Know the human beneath the argument. It is important to remember that, no matter the topic, there's a person on the other end of the argument who deserves respect.

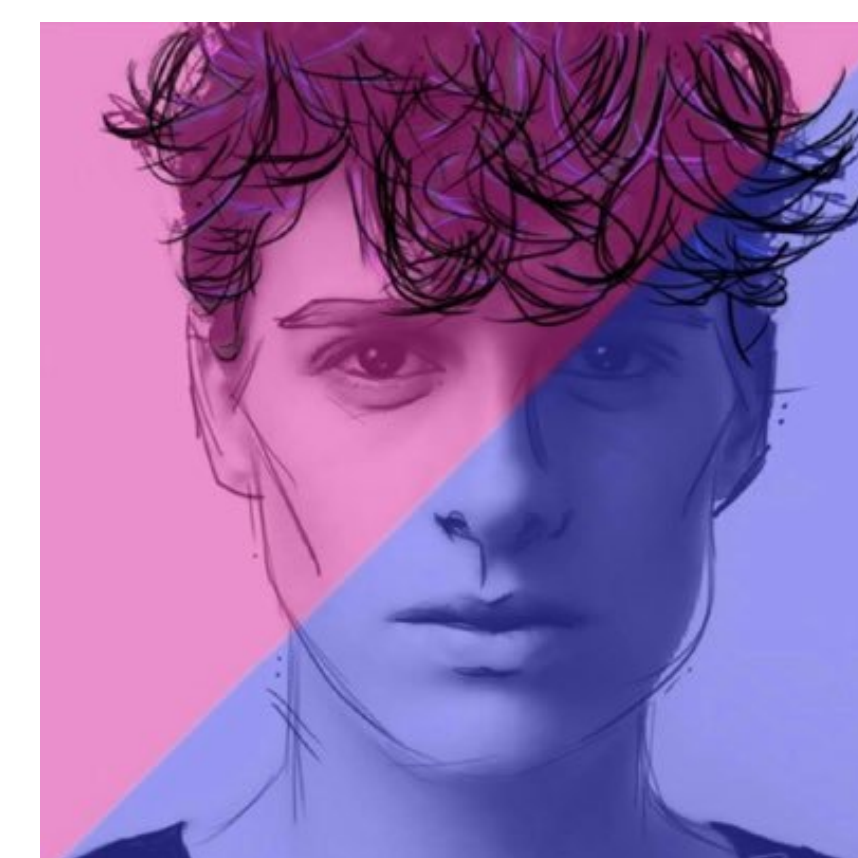
