Retail Assistant – deCordova Sculpture Park and Museum Established in 1950, deCordova Sculpture Park and Museum is the largest park of its kind in New England encompassing 30 acres, 20

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miles west of Boston. Providing a constantly changing landscape of large-scale, outdoor, modern and contemporary sculpture and site-specific installations, the Sculpture Park hosts more than 60 works, the majority of which are on loan to the Museum. Inside, the Museum features a robust slate of rotating exhibitions and innovative interpretive programming. As a retail assistant, you will have the opportunity to work alongside our talented and knowledgeable staff learning about the various components of a successful retail enterprise. Volunteers will receive on-site training as well as learn about the amazing history of deCordova Sculpture Park and Museum.

#### Mechanic Volunteer – Chestnut Hill Farm

Located in Southborough, Chestnut Hill Farm is a hidden gem that provides organic vegetables to the local community through a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program and farm stand. It is a growing endeavor with 250 members. The property is a happy and bustling gathering space for our community throughout the season and we would love to have you join us. As a non-profit and a Trustees property, the farm is also committed to a level of community engagement and education that goes beyond agriculture to include community building and support.
