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
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Embrace the Beauty of Summer

Katie spoke with the employees briefly at a recent Town Hall meeting, and she conveyed confidence and professionalism and a huge interest in getting to know all of our special places ... and our special people. The Board of Directors and Executive Team are thrilled to announce that Katie Theoharides is joining us as President and CEO. She will begin on July 10. Katie joins us after having served as Secretary of Energy and Environmental Affairs for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in the Baker-Polito Administration from 2019-2022. Most recently, she headed up offshore wind operations in the Eastern U.S. for the German energy company RWE.

Katie was a unanimous choice of the Board for many reasons, including her significant management experience, and her deep understanding of and passion for the core mission of The Trustees. She's also not completely new to this organization! Katie's first job in Massachusetts was as Executive Director of the Hilltown Land Trust, an affiliate of The Trustees. She brings a background in ecology and climate science to her impressive career in environmental leadership and land conservation.

I want to thank the members of the Search Committee for the thoughtful process that led to Katie's selection, and to all of you who participated in that process. The committee conducted an extensive listening tour—which included the entire Board and about 40 staff—to understand our opportunities and challenges, and to identify key attributes needed in our next CEO.

In Katie, we have found a proven leader with deep experience in climate, conservation, community engagement, and policy. She is someone who appreciates and embraces the full scope of our mission and the broad range of strategies and tactics we employ to connect people with nature and advance the cause of conservation. Katie will collaborate enthusiastically with all of you to chart a clear and focused strategic path forward, to advance programmatic goals, to support a culture of diversity, belonging, inclusion, and equity, and to promote stability and balance after this sometimes difficult period of transition and change.

Thank you for your patience, focus, and hard work as we completed the search process. You will all get the opportunity to welcome Katie to The Trustees in the weeks and months ahead. We are excited to have her bringing her collaborative, service-oriented leadership style to the organization, and we are confident that she, in partnership with all of you, will add an exciting chapter to The Trustees' enduring legacy.

Property Spotlight - Stevens-Coolidge House and Gardens

Spring has finally sprung in New England and blooms are popping up all around us. It is so refreshing to see the array of color after enduring the gray skies of winter. One of the best places to celebrate the spring season is at the <u>Stevens-Coolidge House & Gardens</u> (SCHG) in North Andover. The Spring Blooms Fest is their signature spring event where you can wander among more than 165,000 tulips bursting with vibrant colors!



The SCHG is a beautiful early 20th-century historic estate which was the summer home of Helen Stevens-Coolidge and her husband John Gardner Coolidge, a descendant of Thomas Jefferson and a nephew to Isabella Stewart Gardner. Helen inherited the property in 1914 and the Coolidge's hired architect Joseph Everett Chandler to remodel the house and transform the grounds into a Colonial Revival style garden. Today, you can enjoy this peaceful outdoor "hidden gem" year-round.

Recently, I visited the property and met with Kaela Robinson, the resident horticulturist at SCHG. Kaela came to The Trustees at the end of last year's Spring Blooms Fest and has hit the ground running getting acquainted with the landscape and planning for this year's growing season. Kaela took me around the property and gave me the rundown on what it takes to prepare for Spring Blooms and maintain the grounds of this incredible property.

With more than 50 planting beds, lots of planning goes into making the new growing season a success. Kaela uses her gardening expertise to design the annual beds, select seedlings for planting and decide what flowers to include in the cutting gardens. She even had to strategize on how to keep the rabbits and deer away from all the flowers and plants. Thankfully, she has some help maintaining this 91-acre property from the Master Gardener Volunteer group which meets regularly during the growing season.



While spring may be the pinnacle time to visit SCHG with its rainbow of tulips, there is always something in bloom throughout the growing season, making it a perfect place for a stroll or picnic. From the moment you arrive, you'll be greeted with a mix of plants and flowers along the walkway. As you make your way around the property, you'll find beautiful perennial gardens, two pick-your-own cutting gardens and a stunning Italian-style Rose Garden filled with lush fragrant roses. A favorite for many is the Potager Garden with its brick serpentine wall. This French Kitchen Garden is made up of a collection of dazzling flowers, fresh herbs, vegetables and fruit trees and is a delight to walk through.

On my visit, I also had the pleasure to meet Julie Olivere who oversees all enterprise operations at SCHG. In addition to running the retail shop, Julie manages all visitor services and is continually looking for new ways to promote a welcoming environment and enhance the visitor's experience. You'll get a glimpse of her touches during Spring Blooms when you see the gigantic paper flowers she created to greet visitors or with the beautiful flower bouquets available for sale in the shop.

In talking with Julie, I learned that Helen left her country estate, including all its contents to The Trustees of Reservations when she died in 1962. Today, when you step inside, it's like walking into a time capsule with all the original furnishings and china. If you have a chance, definitely take a house tour to see this preserved piece of history and learn about its restoration efforts. It is truly magnificent, especially the newly restored mutal wall coverings.



SCHG is always looking for volunteers to help with maintaining the grounds, harvesting flowers or assisting with the events and workshops. Whether you're a seasoned gardener, interested in learning about gardening or just love to be around beautiful flowers, there is definitely something you can do to help out.

Describe your work and responsibilities with The Trustees, especially how that involves volunteers.

My work as an Engagement Manager gives me the opportunity to connect with and work with the public and our community in many ways. I am part of the team that plans all of our public programming at Powisset Farm and Chestnut Hill Farm. I personally plan, organize and execute some of those programs, and am involved with them in a number of ways, managing some of them and helping to run or manage others.

I also manage the local, property-level marketing and communications efforts, such as our social media channels and promotional signage around the property. All of the above can and does involve volunteers, including volunteers who support our events and programs, helping to run them, or volunteers who help out with marketing efforts, such as taking photos for social media or putting up flyers.

What advice would you offer someone who is thinking about volunteering with The Trustees?

Whatever you are interested in doing, you can do it with The Trustees. With so many different types of properties, so many different programs and events, and so many things always happening, there are countless volunteer opportunities and they run the gamut. June is Pride Month

Happy Pride! This Pride month, The Trustees has been celebrating the LGBTQ+ community with events, hikes, programs, and parties across Massachusetts. Eliza, Volunteer Services Manager, got the chance to visit Naumkeag in the Berkshires for their annual Berkshire Pride Tea Dance which was held on Sunday June 5th.

Did you Know? Gay Tea Dances were organized on Sunday afternoons in the gay community, originating in New York in the 1950s and 1960s. It was illegal through the mid-1960s for bars in New York to sell alcohol to gay people, and New York City police would conduct raids on establishments serving gay folks. So gay people in the area began to hold tea dances outside the city as an alternative and serving tea rather than alcohol, making them safer and less law-defying.



What is Juneteenth, and why is The Trustees Celebrating it?



Juneteenth celebrates the emancipation of all enslaved people in the United States, and specifically celebrates when a group of enslaved African Americans in Galveston, Texas first learned of their freedom from Slavery in 1865.

As part of our mission to create inclusive spaces of belonging where everyone can feel welcome, The Trustees is celebrating Juneteenth with a variety of events, both to commemorate the ending of slavery in the United States as well as to welcome and invite everyone from the Black, African American, and American Descendants of Slavery (ADOS) communities onto our properties. We encourage you to attend any of our Juneteenth events and celebrate, learn, reflect, and understand what you can do to be an ally and partner to the Black, African American, and American Descendants of Slavery (ADOS) communities.
